Officer Programs.

I. State Officer Candidate School (OCS) is a 3-phase program conducted during Inactive Duty Training (IDT) weekends and two 15-day Annual Training (AT) periods. The entire program takes 18 months to complete. This OCS program is conducted by the 197th Regional Training Institute (RTI) according to the following schedule. . .

Example:

Phase 0	Preparatory training begins with weekend training assemblies at Camp Dawson in February through May of each year
Phase I	A 15-day AT period in July at Camp Fredrick, Maryland
Phase II	IDT (weekend training) at Camp Dawson begins immediately after Phase I, August through June of the following year
Phase III	A 15-day AT period at Fort McClellan, Alabama in July of your second year
Graduation	Lieutenant Bar is pinned on in August of your second year

Approximately 6 months prior to completion of state OCS, you will choose an officer branch and unit of assignment. Upon completion of the Accelerated OCS program, you will receive your commission and the “gold” bar.

a. State OCS Enrollment Criteria:

- Minimum of 60 semester credits prior o Phase I start date
- Minimum GT score from ASVAB of 110
- Minimum age 18, maximum age 30 to commission (up to age 35 with state waiver)
- AIT graduate unless OCS enlistment option
- Pass standard 3-event Army Physical Fitness Test / Meet height and weight standards
- Have a secret security clearance or a clearance request submitted
- Must be a U.S. citizen
- Pass a medical examination for commission (Chapter 2, AR 40-501)
- All physical or moral waivers must have been requested (if applicable)

b. Additional Criteria for Commission as a 2LT

- Minimum of 90 semester hours
- Minimum SAT/850 or ACT/19 (NA if college graduate)
- Pass another standard 3-event APFT / Continue to meet height and weight standards

c. Incentives:

- Paid as an E6
- MGIB Kicker of \$350.00
- Commissioning bonus of \$2,000.

II. The National Guard Bureau's Accelerated OCS (501) program is challenging 8-week, 3-Phase program conducted at Fort McClellan, Alabama. It is conducted only once each year between January and March.

Prior to departing for the 501 program, you will have to choose a branch and unit to be appointed in – your unit/battalion commander will assist you with these choices. Upon completion of the Accelerated OCS program, you may receive your commission and gold bar as early as mid April.

a. Accelerated OCS (501) /enrollment/Appointment Criteria:

- Minimum of 90 semester credits
- Minimum SAT/850 or ACT/19 (N/A if college graduate)
- Minimum GT score (from ASVAB) of 110
- Minimum age 18, maximum age 30 (up to age 35 with state waiver)
- AIT graduate unless enlisted under the OCS enlistment option
- Pass standard 3-event Army Physical Fitness Test / Meet height and weight standards
- Have a secret security clearance or a clearance request submitted
- Must be a U.S. citizen
- Pass a medical examination for commission (Chapter 2, AR 40-501)
- All physical or moral waivers must have been approved (if applicable)

b. Incentives:

- Paid as an E6
- MGIB Kicker of \$350.00

III. The National Guard Bureau's Accelerated Summer OCS Program is challenging 8-week, 3-Phase program conducted at Camp Fredrick, Maryland, Fort Indiantown Gap, Pennsylvania, and Fort McClellan, Alabama. It is conducted in the months of June - August.

Prior to departing for the Accelerated Summer OCS Program, you will have to choose a branch and unit to be appointed in – your unit/battalion commander will assist you with these choices. Upon completion of the Accelerated OCS program, you will receive your commission and gold bar in August of that year.

a. Accelerated OCS /enrollment/Appointment Criteria:

- Minimum of 90 semester credits
- Minimum SAT/850 or ACT/19 (N/A if college graduate)
- Minimum GT score (from ASVAB) of 110
- Minimum age 18, maximum age 30 (up to age 35 with state waiver)
- AIT graduate unless enlisted under the OCS enlistment option
- Pass standard 3-event Army Physical Fitness Test / Meet height and weight standards
- Have a secret security clearance or an interim secrete clearance
- Must be a U.S. citizen
- Pass a medical examination for commission (Chapter 2, AR 40-501)
- All physical or moral waivers must have been approved (if applicable)

b. Incentives:

- Paid as an E6
- MGIB Kicker of \$350.00

IV. Federal OCS is a 14-week program conducted at Ft. Benning, Georgia, home of the Infantry. Here you learn “officership” with male and female soldiers from the Active Army, National Guard and Army Reserve. There are many opportunities throughout the training year to attend one of the OCS classes.

Prior to departing for the federal OCS program, you will have to choose a branch and unit to be appointed in your unit/battalion commander will assist you with these choices. Upon completion of the OCS, you will receive your commission and the gold bar pinned on during a graduation ceremony at Ft. Benning.

a. Federal OCS Enrollment/Appointment Criteria:

- Minimum of 90 semester credits
- Minimum SAT/850 or ACT/19 (NA if college graduate)
- Minimum GT score of 110 (from ASVAB)
- Minimum age 18, maximum age 30 (up to age 35 with state waiver)
- AIT graduate unless OCS enlistment option
- Pass standard 3-event Army Physical Fitness Test / Meet height and weight standards
- Have a secret security clearance or a clearance request submitted
- Must be a U.S. citizen
- Pass a medical examination for commission (Chapter 2, AR 40-501)
- All physical or moral waivers must be approved (if applicable)

b. Incentives:

- Paid as an E5
- MGIB Kicker of \$350

V. Army Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) is the college elective that trains the Army’s (and the National Guard’s) future commissioned officers. ROTC combines classroom work with practical instruction on how to take charge and take command – skills that can help you succeed later in either a military or civilian career. Army ROTC is traditionally a 4-year program, which is divided into two parts: a Basic Course and an Advanced Course. The Basic Course is usually taken during your freshman and sophomore years. The Advance Course is usually taken during your final two years of college and includes a paid six-week Advance Camp that is normally attended in the summer between your junior and senior years.

If you are already a member of the National Guard who has completed basic training and advanced individual training, you can participate in ROTC and need only complete the Advance Course (junior and senior year). You can also be part of the National Guard’s Simultaneous Membership Program as an SMP Cadet. There is a good likelihood that scholarships might be available for individuals selecting a Guaranteed Reserve Forces Contract – this insures that you will be able to accept your commission in the National Guard versus an active duty commitment. These scholarships are **IN ADDITION** to other incentives offered by the West Virginia Army National Guard.

a. Senior Army ROTC Enrollment Criteria for Advance Course

- Grade point average of 2.0 or better
- 60 Semester credits
- Complete Army basic training and advanced individual training to enter MS III

b. Additional Criteria for Commission as a 2LT

- Must complete 4 consecutive semesters as MS III and MS IV
- Maximum age for commissioning is 27
- Pass standard 3-event Army Physical Fitness Test / Meet height and weight standards
- Have a secret security clearance or a clearance request submitted
- Must be a US citizen
- Pass a medical examination for commission (Chapter 2, AR 40-501)
- All waivers must be approved if applicable

c. Incentives:

- Paid as an E5
- MGIB of \$350 (if eligible)
- ROTC pay of \$350

VI. Direct Commission is a vehicle to obtain a commission for individuals who have demonstrated superb leadership potential during their service. The intent of the ARNG direct commissioning program is to offer an alternate-commissioning source to exceptionally qualified individuals. Individuals with NCOER’s indicating above average accomplishments and leadership skills would be potential candidates. Strong NCOER’s and letters of recommendation from the Company and Battalion Command are a must.

a. Basic Branch Direct Commission Application Criteria

- Minimum of a 4-year college degree
- Minimum of two years active duty
- Current member of the National Guard in grade of SGT or above
- Minimum GT score (from ASVAB) of 110
- Minimum age 18, maximum age 30 (up to age 35 with state waiver)
- Pass standard 3-event Army Physical Fitness Test / Meet height and weight standards
- Have a secret security clearance or a clearance request submitted
- Must be a citizen
- Pass a medical examination (at MEPS or Army Medical Treatment Facility) for commission (Chapter 2, AR 40-501)
- Statement of never having been enrolled in OCS
- All waivers must be approved before a packet can be submitted

The Simultaneous Membership Program (SMP)

The Army National Guard and U.S. Army Reserve Officers’ Training Corps (ROTC) offer the SMP to qualified full time college students who are members of the Army National Guard or willing to join. SMP is a two-year program whereby cadets serve in the Army National Guard and attend ROTC classes “simultaneously”. SMP begins in the fall semester of a full time student’s junior year in college or the first year of graduate school or a combination of both undergraduate and graduate level programs. Cadets receive a commission as a 2nd lieutenant in the United States Army after completion of a bachelor’s degree or graduate degree and the ROTC advanced course. Newly commissioned officers then serve in the Army National Guard or on active duty.

Great Benefits

Because cadets participate in both Guard training and ROTC at the same time, the benefits of the SMP are twofold. First, SMP cadets **receive the** excellent management and leadership training that ROTC offers. Then, during the monthly training weekends, SMP cadets apply their classroom training in a “real world” military unit in the Army National Guard – an opportunity unavailable to traditional ROTC scholarship cadets. Second, SMP cadets qualify for tuition assistance programs offered by both organizations “simultaneously.”

Qualified West Virginia Army National Guard SMP cadets can receive the following financial benefits:

- The WV Army National Guard 100% Tuition Assistance (based on the tuition of WVU)
- The Montgomery G.I. Bill (\$282 per month)
- The Montgomery G.I. Bill Kicker (\$350 per month)
- Drill pay at the E-5 level prior to commissioning (about \$210 per month)
- ROTC stipend (subsistence allowance):
 - College Juniors - \$350 per month (for 12 months)
 - College Seniors - \$400 per month (for 9-10 months)
- Pay for attending the National Advanced Leadership Camp (about \$660)

The two programs combined can offer qualified SMP Cadets close to \$30,000 in pay and benefits during their last two years of college.

Experience

Because of their military training and experience, Guard soldiers are exempt from ROTC Basic Course (freshman and sophomores courses, Military Science I and II). Instead, Guard soldiers enroll directly into Advanced ROTC (Military Science II and IV, junior and senior courses). During the school week, SMP cadets participate in all ROTC classes, labs and field training exercises. On training weekends, they work with their assigned National Guard units. During these weekends, SMP cadets function as assistant lieutenants. SMP cadets wear their ROTC ranks and carry out all the duties of a new second lieutenant in a supervised, on-the-job-training environment.

How SMP works

First and foremost, to qualify for the SMP you must be a member of the Army National Guard and have attended at least Army Basic Combat Training (BCT). Ideally, you will have attended both BCT and Advanced Individual Training (AIT) before signing an SMP Contract. AIT is the phase of active duty training all Guard soldiers must go through to learn their Military Occupational Specialty (MOS). Completing AIT is important as it qualifies you for the Montgomery G.I. Bill benefits.

The next step is to be accepted to, and attend a college or university offering ROTC courses. Before you begin your junior year of college, you must complete an SMP Agreement contact (NGB Form 594-1) with the commander of your unit. Take your SMP contract to your school's Army ROTC Enrollment Officer and ensure you begin processing with the ROTC department. Once contracting is complete, you begin attending ROTC classes. The course takes about seven hours per week (a two-hour class, a two-hour lab and three hours of physical fitness).

After the completion of Military Science (MS) III (junior year), you will attend the six week ROTC Advanced Camp at Fort Lewis, WA instead of their regular Guard Annual Training. After Advanced Camp, you return for your senior year, and enroll in MSIV. After graduation, you will receive your commission as a second lieutenant in the Army National Guard.

Officer Basic Course

Training is not over after graduation. Commissioned ROTC graduates must attend Officer Basic Course (OBC), within one year of their commissioning date. During this period of active duty training, officers learn skills needed to operate in their Branch specialty. OBC averages 12-16 weeks in length. Cadets are assigned a branch usually during the fall semester of the last year of college. Typically, SMP cadets are branched in the unit they are assigned to at the time of accession.

Guaranteed Reserve Forces Duty

Prior to contracting with ROTC and SMP status, a soldier can apply for a Guaranteed Reserve Forces Duty (GRFD) contract through the ROTC department. GRFD status is mandatory for cadet with an Army National Guard scholarship. These cadets are required to serve in the National Guard or Reserve after graduation and commissioning.

The \$350 G.I. Bill Kicker

The National Guard needs young officers. Therefore, as an incentive, the Army National Guard offers a special Montgomery G.I. Bill Kicker of \$350 a month. Only cadets eligible to receive the Montgomery G.I. Bill can apply for this special kicker. The GRFD Kicker pays \$350 a month in addition to the Montgomery G.I. Bill benefits, worth \$282 a month.

ROTC Basic Course

Traditionally, ROTC is a four-year program consisting of two phases: Basic Course and Advanced Course. Basic Course refers to the freshman and sophomore level ROTC classes, MSI and MSII. These classes cover subjects like military history, traditions and organizations, and national defense. There is a strong emphasis on leadership development during these first two years. This offers a unique opportunity for students to gain hands-on leadership skills while in college.

Advanced Course

The Advanced Course is the final two years of the ROTC program, MSIII and MSIV. The curriculum is more intense and prepares you for the challenges of military leadership.

During MSIII, you will be trained in small unit tactics and learn the duties and responsibilities of a squad and platoon leader. This phase of training is combined with classroom instruction on land navigation, military tactics, and how to prepare and present operation orders.

During MSIV, you will be in various cadet leadership positions that will challenge your leadership abilities and prepare you to become a second lieutenant. You will also be responsible for the training and evaluation of cadets in the MSI – MSIII classes.

National Advanced Leadership Camp

Advanced Camp is the single most important block of training in the career of the ROTC cadet. This is the first exposure to the Active Army for many cadets. This segment of the cadet's education provides one third of the evaluation for accession and branch selection at commissioning. Advanced Camp's mission is to train cadets to Army standards, refine leadership skills, and evaluate officer potential.

This phase of ROTC is intentionally tough and stressful. The days are long with considerable night training, and no days off. Throughout Camp, cadets encounter physical and mental obstacles challenging them as a person, soldier, and leader. The camp cadre use small unit tactical training as the primary method for evaluating cadet potential to serve as a Commissioned Officer. Training is sequenced in a logical, building-block manner. The training covers the basic military skills necessary for leading soldiers in tactical exercises at individual, squad, and platoon levels. Cadets serve in positions of leadership from squad to company level where they are evaluated on their leadership, organization, and teamwork skills. Evaluation is constant and begins shortly after the cadet arrives. The camp cadre of Tactical Officers and NCO's advise, coach, and ultimately render an official evaluation of the cadet's potential to serve as an officer.

Questions Medical Professionals are asking about membership in the WV Army National Guard...

Q. WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF THE GUARD?

A. The National Guard performs a dual mission. Involves providing community support and disaster relief in the event of a local emergency. The federal mission involves the Guard in support of the active Army during a national emergency.

Q. DOES THE GUARD HAVE ANY COLLEGE LOAN REPAYMENT PROGRAMS?

A. Yes. Currently there is a \$50,000 Health Professional Loan Repayment Program. This program pays 20/20/10 per year to your leading institution. If you are not eligible for the federal program, then you may apply for the WV Guard's own program. This program will reimburse you for \$20,000 a year for two years, then \$10,000 the third year.

Q. DOES THE ARMY NATIONAL GUARD OFFER ANY MILITARY SPECIALTY TRAINING?

A. Yes. Physicians and fourth year medical students may apply to attend the Army Flight Surgeon's Course. Physicians and nurses may attend their civilian CME, CHE or CEU programs in a paid status.

Q. DOES THE GUARD HAVE ANY ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS TO HELP ME CONTINUE MY EDUCATION?

A. Yes. Qualifying medical students and nurses may be eligible for Specialized Training Assistance Program (STRAP, \$1133 monthly). This program pays a monthly stipend while you are in your qualifying specialty-training program. Third and Fourth year medical students may apply for the Clinical Clerkship Training Program (CCTP). This allows you to complete clinical rotations at Army Hospitals in a paid status.

Q. EXPLAIN THE MEDICAL STUDENT COMMISSIONING PROGRAM.

A. This program allows a medical student, MD or DO to apply for direct commission in the Guard. You are not required to attend Basic Training or any additional obligation after medical school. You are only obligated to attend one weekend per month and two weeks annually.

Questions Religion Professionals are asking about membership in the WV Army National Guard...

Q. WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF THE GUARD?

A. The National Guard performs a dual mission. The state mission involves providing community support and disaster relief in the event of a local emergency.

Q. WHAT ABOUT MY CHURCH SERVICES ON SUNDAY MORNINGS?

A. Commanders understand your need and requirement to be in your church on Sundays. Commanders allow Chaplains to balance their time to ensure they meet their military obligations at the same time meeting their church requirements.

Q. WHAT ARE MY DUTIES AND FUNCTIONS AS A CHAPLAIN IN THE GUARD?

A. Your function is a Special Staff Officer for the Commander. Your duties may vary depending on the unit and the Commander, but could include; Working with the Family Support Group, provide guidance and support to soldiers and establishing programs to help the unit.

Q. HOW DO I KNOW WHAT MY ASSIGNED UNIT WILL BE?

A. Your unit will be identified before you come into the Guard. Unit assignments are based on a combination of your interview with our Chief Chaplain and the unit Commander during your application process. This allows you to get all your specific questions and meet the members of the unit you will work with.

Q. I AM GOING BACK TO SEMINARY SCHOOL TO GET MY M. DIV. WHAT PROGRAMS ARE AVAILABLE FOR ME?

A. Students in Seminary are eligible for appointment as a Chaplain Candidates, normally as Second Lieutenants. This program allows you to work closely with military Chaplains during the week. You may be eligible to receive the Montgomery G.I. Bill.

WARRANT OFFICER

Who can become a Warrant Officer in the WV Army National Guard? You Can. If you are currently an E-5 (p), with BNCOC or higher, (in a feeder MOS) in the Army National Guard, A USAR soldier, a transitioning active component soldier or a current or former Warrant Officer. There are some basic requirements you must meet as determined by the Army National Guard. Applicants must:

- be between the ages of 18 and 46 (waiverable)
- score 110 or above on the General Aptitude Area Test
- be able to successfully pass all events on the Army Physical Fitness test
- meet certain mandatory technical qualifications for your specific MOS
- meet certain medical, security and licensing requirements
